ACCIDENT TO THE STEAMSHIP "INSHTRAHULL." -An accident which might have been attended with serious results happened to the Clyde Shipping Company's steamer "Insheranull" on Saturday night, whilst she was proceeding from this port to Glasgow. When she had reached Beigh Castle the tube leading from the boilers suddenly burst and the steamer consequence was allowed to make her way , until what steam was in the boiler had been exhausted, as otherwise there was no means of stopping her. The Engineer, Mr T Thompson, who was standing in close proximity to the boiler at the time of the occurrence, was severely scalded, and it was found necessary to have him removed to Barrington's Hospital, where he is still undergoing medical treatment. The fireman also received injuries, which, however, were not of a very serious nature. Repairs were at once effected, and yesterday morning the steamer proceeded on her journey to Glasgow.
