LONDON CATTLE MARKET, this day—600 beasts, 2s 4d to 5s; 5,600 sheep and lambs, quiet—sheep 3s 2d to 6s; lambs, 6s to 6s 8d. 80 calves, 3s 8d to 5s 2d; 30 pigs, 2s 4d to 4s per 8lbs. 20 English milch cows, £10 to £21 per head.

BRISTOL CATTLE MARKET, this day—Moderate supply of fat cattle; trade firm, prices ranging from 56s to 67s. Large supply of sheep and lambs, which sold at from 8d to 8½d. About 400 pigs were penned; baconers made 9s, and porkers 9s 6d. Trade was still slow for the 2,200 store cattle, but most were disposed of.

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET, this day—The supply of stock here to-day was much the same as last week; trade improved all round. Beef made from 10s to 15s a head more; sheep firm, at former top figures; lambs, 2s each dearer. Beef, 45s to 63s; mutton, 6½d to 8d; pigs were not so well sold as last week.
