A MAN DROWNED.—The body of a man named Patrick Kelly was found in the river near the Custom House Quay this morning about half-past eight o'clock. It appeared that he was a butcher by trade, and resided at Charlotte's Quay with his family. This morning at about five o'clock his son, before proceeding to work, went to his father's room and found no trace of him, though it is alleged his clothes were there. The matter was some time afterwards reported to the police. An inquest will be held touching the cause of death.
