EVICCTIONS.—Yesterday two large tenants on
the Earl of Dunraven's estate at Ballystein were
evicted for non-payment of rent, a considerable
sum, it appears, having been due. The tenants
offered a year's rent, without costs, which was
refused. Caretakers were put in possession of
the premises. A force of sixty police accom-
panied the sheriff, but everything passed off
quietly. However, as the force was returning
home several barriers of stones were found placed
across the lane way leading to the public road,
which retarded their progress a little.

THE DOON MURDER CASE.—Yesterday, at New
Pallas Petty Sessions, before Mr J B Irwin, R M,
a labourer named John Ryan was brought up to
answer a charge of having been one of the party
who at Doon on the 12th inst inflicted wounds on
William Leahy, a bailiff, from the effects of
which he died in a few days at Tipperary Work-
house Hospital. Leahy served an order of the
Queen's Bench on the Rev Patrick O'Donnell, and
the allegation is that the service being effected in
the chapel was the motive for the attack on the
deceased. On the application of District Inspector
Dunne, the case was adjourned for a fortnight.

MORTALITY STATISTICS.—The average annual
death-rate represented by the deaths registered
last week in the sixteen principal Town Districts
of Ireland was 23.3 per 1,000 of the population.
The deaths registered during the past week in the
several towns, alphabetically arranged, corres-
ponded to the following annual rates per 1,000 :—
Armagh, 10.3; Belfast, 23.9; Cork, 24.0; Drogh-
eda, 42.3; Dublin, 23.3; Dundalk, 17.5; Galway,
3.4; Kilkenny, 29.6; Limerick, 27.0; Lisburn,
14.5; Londonderry, 19.6; Lurgan, 35.9; Newry,
10.5; Sligo, 4.8; Waterford, 30.1; Wexford, 34.2.
The deaths from the principal zymotic diseases
in the 16 districts were equal to an annual rate of
2.4 per 1,000, the rates varying from 0.0 in
Galway, Newry, Dundalk, Sligo, and Armagh, to
15.4 in Lurgan; the 7 deaths from all causes
registered in the last-named district, comprising
2 from measles and 1 from diarrhoea.
