SAD FATAL ACCIDENT TO A CLERGYMAN.—On
Sunday night last while Rev T Madden, C C, and
Rev E Sheehy, P P, were driving home to
Bruree from a funeral, the horse became restive,
and partly over-turning the car, both gentlemen
were pitched out on the road. Father Madden
was a little stunned by the fall, but after a while
got better, and the journey was resumed. One of
the wheels, however, which must have been
damaged by the accident, suddenly gave way,
the occupants were again thrown out. Father
Madden was very seriously injured. Two of his
ribs being broken, and he was in an unconscious
condition for hours. Father Sheehy was also
severely shaken. Both clergymen were conveyed
to Bruree, where, notwithstanding all that
medical aid could do, Father Madden succumbed
to the injuries received on Thursday night. The
remains were interred to-day at Mount St
Laurence Cemetery. The *cortege* was very large,
his Lordship the Most Rev Dr O'Dwyer and nearly
all the clergy in the county being amongst those
present. The Bishop, assisted by some of his
clergy, officiated. The sad demise of Father
Madden at the early age of 36 is much regretted
by all who knew him. He was a native of
Limerick, and had been some eleven years in the
Church. During his ministry he taught
in the Diocesan Seminary; had been for a con-
siderable time attached to Donoughmore parish,
and about a year ago was appointed curate of
the parish of Rockhill and Bruree. Father
Sheehy, we understand, is still confined in his
bed.
