FUNERAL OF THE LATE STEPHEN
JOSEPH MEANY.
The funeral of the late Stephen Joseph Meany
which took place on Sunday last, was a very which took place on Sunday mat, was a very imposing one. As already published, Mr Meany died at Waterbury, Connecticut, where he had been editing a newspaper known as the Brushy Democrat, and his remails were brought across to Ireland for interment at Dromcliffe churchyard, situate within a mile of his native town. Contingents of Nationalists attended from all Contingents of Nationalists attended from all parts of the county and also from Galway. Tipperary, Limerick and Cork. A special train leaving Limerick at eleven o'clock, was well freighted with passengers and also the Victualiers and St John's Bands. A large force of police and Military (Sherwood Foresters) were drafted into town, under the command of Captain Welsh. B. M, but no interference whatever was made with the demonstration. The procession left the chapel, where the body had been since its arrival in Ennis, shortly after half past two o'clock. Some twenty bands with muffled drums played the "Dead March," numberless draped banners and bannerettes were carried by those in the procession, and the processionists were cape. the procession, and the processionists were crape on the left arm, interwoven with green. The order of the procession was as follows—First came the bier drawn by four horses, then the floral wreaths (which were brought from America), after which came the Victualler. Brass Band, Limerick, and St John's fife and drum band, Limerick, Next came the casket containing the remains and immediately follow-ing it was Mr John D Meany (son of the deceased), Mrs Meany (mother), Mrs Francis, of New York (sister) and Mr Martin Scally, of Waterbury, into whose tharge the remains were given before leaving Anterica. Next in order was the deputation from Cork who carried wreaths from the Cork National League, and the Cork Young Ireland Society. Next in order were the members of the Daleassian Club, the members of the Odd-Fellows branch, Ennis; the Dalgey Club, Newmarket-on-Fergus; the Doora Club, the Mechanics' brass band, Ennis the deputation from the Limerick Congregated Trades; the members of the Ennis Mechanics Institute, the harness makers and shoe makers, Ennis; the sawyers and bakers, Ennis; the bakers and joiners, Limerick; the Kildysar Hurling Club, the Corofin Hurling Club, the Artick's Juvenile Fife and Drum Band, Ennis; St Patrick's Temperance Hurling Club, Hunis; The Crusheen Brass Band, the Killowen Hurling Club, the Quin Football Club, the Ardsollus Football Club, St Mary's Fife and Drum Band, Limerick; the A M Sullivan Hurling Club, Ennis; the Boherbuoy Fife and Drum Bind, Limerick; No 1 National Brass Band, Limerick; the Inagh. A long line of vehicles followed, and the rere was brought up by another line of pedestrians. The route was from the New Chapel, through O'Connell Square, Bindon street, Harmony Row, past the monument to the Manchester martyrs, through Millstreet, Church street, and thence to Dromcliffe Churchyard. The latter place was reached at four o'clock. The grave was lined with brick, and when the casket was lowered into it, it was covered over with flags, thus forming a wallt.
When the coffin had been lowered into the

grave, and before the covering was placed over the casket, Mr Snelling, who stood by the grave, addressed the concourse at some length on the

late Mr Meany's career:
Mr Stephen Clancy also spoke, calling upon every one present "to make a vow that the principles of Meany's life would be perpetuated, and that his ashes would never have to raise up against his fellow-countrymen in reproach for any of their acts. He said "they would live con-formably to the principles of the dead patriot until they had once more restored to our land her stolen rights" (applause).

The grave was then flagged over and the people dispersed.
On returning from Ennis to Clure Castle in the evening the soldiers sang, when passing through the streets, "God Save the Queen" and "Eule Britannia," waving their helmets and cheering at the conclusion of each verse, but no unpleasant-ness arose in consequence of the incident.
