CITY POLICE COURT. — Alderman Landers (*locum tenens* for the Mayor) and Doctor O'Shaughnessy presided at the City Police Court yesterday. SUDDEN DEATH OF MR ROBERT MITCHELL.— We record with much regret the sudden death at Kilkee of Mr Robert Mitchell, Superintendent of the Great Southern and Western Railway for Limerick and a large district surrounding it. It would seem that Mr Mitchell in apparently his usual good health left town by steamer on Saturday afternoon, to join his wife and family at Kilkee, but he had reached his destination only a short time when he expired, it is supposed from heart disease. His demise has caused the greatest shock to his numerous friends, and the deepest sympathy is felt with Mrs Mitchell and family in their deep affliction. The remains were removed yesterday, *en route* to Clonmel, for interment. The funeral took place to-day, a very large number of citizens and several of the officials of both railway companies being present. Mr Mitchell was a most efficient and courteous official, esteemed by all with whom he came in contact.

SEIZURE OF CATTLE AT SHANAGOLDEN. — A correspondent signing himself "Truth" writes to say that on the morning of the 12th September, the cattle of Mr Michael Fitzgibbon, near Shanagolden, were seized for the sum of £40 17s 6d for rent and costs. A writ, he states, had been served on Fitzgibbon at the suit of Mr Langford, of Kilcosgrave, for a half year's rent, £20, due 25th of March, and £10 arrears—but out of which he holds poor rate to the amount of £3 should have been allowed—making in all £30. Costs to the amount of £10 17s 6d were charged on the tenant.
