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hall was tastefully decorated, and the effect was perhaps more striking than usual owing to the varied and attractive character of the arrangements. In addition to the permanent ornamentation, streamers of laurel connected with the gas-standards were stretched across the room, and appropriate inscriptions worked on a red ground, such as *caed mille fallthe*, were placed in conspicuous places. The stalls were works of art in themselves. Another fancy stall is held by Mrs Wm Vanderkiste, Pery-square assisted by Mrs Vanderkiste, Mrs Edward Gabbett, Miss Dartnell, Miss Seymour, Galway, Miss Louides, and Miss A Seymour. At this stall a beautiful presentation album will be raffled, as also a tea table and set of china. The articles on view include a mechanical and musical doll, and a variety of useful and ornamental wares too numerous to mention.

The Refreshment stall is held by Mrs Finch, assisted by Mrs George and Mrs F J Finch, Miss Ellen Russell and Miss Green.
