SAD DROWNING ACCIDENT.

Mr Coroner DeCoursey and a jury held an inquest yesterday on the remains of Hugh Roberts, 24, unmarried, mate of the barque "Elizabeth Spears," whose body was picked up out of the river, near the Sarsfield Bridge, about 2 o'clock on Sunday morning. From the evidence it appeared that the deceased got a pound from Captain Spears at 8 o'clock on Saturday evening, when he left the vessel. Meeting some comrades, he had drink in some publichouses. He subsequently met a sailor, whom he told that he had been beaten by three men. His friend was seeing him to the ship, when Roberts said he would prefer to go alone, so that he might be able to get on board without the captain seeing him. A girl named Dooley deposed that she saw the deceased walk towards the barque, catch a rope, and, missing his hold, fall into the river. A young man named Ro, hearing the splash in the water, got a boat and went to the rescue of the drowning man, but failed in the attempt. He then called up Captain Spears, and a search being made, the body was recovered, but life was then extinct. Dr J R Shanahan, who had examined the remains, deposed that the external appearance of drowning was absent. There was a punctured wound behind the ear, and the nose was cut and bleeding. He could not say precisely what was the cause of death without having made a *post mortem* examination. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death. The coroner complimented Head Constable Murray on the careful and successful manner in which he had procured evidence tracing the deceased from the time he left the ship until the unfortunate fatality occurred. The "Elizabeth Spears" brought in a cargo of gypsum from Mikromontz.
