SHOCKING CAR ACCIDENT.—A MAN KILLED.

Late on Monday night a shocking accident occurred near Ahawilk. A farmer named Jeremiah Scanlan, who states that on Monday night he, in company with another man named Hogan, was journeying home from Newcastle West, and they came on all right until arriving at the passage leading to his house. The passage from the roadway to his (Scanlan's) house is over a quarter of a mile in length. On entering the passage the car on which they were seated struck against the pier of the gate. The force of the collision threw both men off the car. In the fall it appears that the unfortunate man Hogan struck his head against a large stone, dashing out his brains. Death was almost instantaneous. Scanlan also fell on some stones, which cut him severally about the face and neck. He is not, as at first reported, seriously injured. The man Hogan who was killed is about 35 years of age, and is a harness-maker by trade. He resides at Glenquin, Co. Limerick, where his body was removed on yesterday for interment. An inquest was held by Dr John M. Ambrose, Coroner, Newcastle West, and a verdict of accidental death returned.—COR.
