At the second annual meeting of the above Company on Tuesday, the following report and balance sheet of accounts was adopted:—The directors submit herewith a statement of the Company's accounts up to the 31st December 1889. The profits as per profit and loss account to £2,910 8s 8d. Out of this the directors have paid a dividend at the rate of 7 per centum (free of Income tax), for half-year ending July, 1888 (£875), and recommended a dividend for half-year to 31st January, 1889, absorbing in the two dividends the sum of £1,750, and leaving a surplus of £1,160 8s 8d, which the directors propose to divide as follows, viz:—to be written off against the account, £559 9s 6d; off preliminary account (20 per cent), £243 5s 8d; to add to the balance the sum of £500, to make up to a balance £57 18s 6d, to be carried forward to next year's account. Mr B. Guy retired from the Board by ballot and was re-elected. Mr John Shanks, of the Company was also re-elected.
