CLARE CASTLE FAIR .- This fair, held on Thursday, was well supplied with cattle, sheep, It was considered a tolerably good one, and a large amount of business was transacted. The prices were steady, but showed a slight reducton of those realised at the recent quarterly fair of Clonroad. Yearlings were in great demand at from £8 to £11; two-year-olds, £11 to £14; three-year-olds, £13 to £16 each. There was a fine show of sheep, prime hoggets fetching from 42s to 52s each. Pigs were cleared off at from 47s per cwt for berwicks to 49s for bacon, Limerick buyers securing choice lots.

FOUND DROWNED .- Yesterday evening the body of a child named John Beehan was discovered in the river at the foot of Shannon-street by some boatmen. The child had been missing since Tuesday or Wednesday evening, and as no trace of him could be found in the city, it was deemed advisable to institute a search in the river, with the result stated. Deceased was about seven years of age, and it seems left his home in Arthur's Quay in company with younger twin brothers, from whom he strayed. Mr M. DeCourcy and a jury held an inquest on the body last evening, and evidence having been given, a verdict of accidental death from drowning was returned.
