E CASTLE FAIR .- This fair, held on RE-OPENING OF KILLARNEY CHURCH.

Archdeacon Wynne, the parishioners of Kil-It was considered a tolerably good larney and its beautiful district, and, indeed, the Church of Ireland in general, may well be congratulated upon the imposing and impressive ceremonies which on Wednesday last attended the recopening of the beautiful church of Killarney for Divine Service. This fine edifice was, as our readers are aware, maliciously burned down a little more than a year since; and it is a cheering and powerful proof of the energy with which its restoration was pushed that the building has not only risen from its ashes more beautiful than in its p istine state, but a very fine organ has also been provided, which instrument was dedicated to its sacred use at the special service on Wednesday. The building is cruciform, and consists of nave, north transept, in which is the organ-chamber; south transept, and chancel, with a very effective octagonal apse. The roof is panelled in pitch pine, of which material the benches are also constructed. The pulpit and prayer-desk are of white stone, with granite columns, a most effective combination; and most of the windows are of richly stained glass. The walls of the nave and transepts are decorated in colours by the well-known Dublin artist, Mr. R. Mannix, and were we to be hyper-critical we would bint that possibly too lavish a use has been made of the stencil-plate; but the colours are well chosen, and the effect is very rich. Upon the occasion of the re-opening ceremonies the church was generously beautified with flowers, the varied hues and lovely odours of which lent other charms to the scene. The following clergymen, representing the Dioceses of Aghadoe, Ardfert, Cork, and Limerick, assembled at the house of Mr F. Nunan, nearly opposite the church, at 11.30 o'clock, and walked thence in full canonicals to the church at 12 o'clock, the building being completely filled by an earnest and devout congregation. The procession was headed by his Lordship the Bishop of Cork (who occupied the place of the Lord Bishop of Limerick, and then followed the Dean of Ardfert, the Archdescon of Ardfert, the Archdeacon of Aghadoe, Rector of Killarney; Canons Nicholson, D. Powell, R. Wills, and C. Moore; Revs. Dr. Haydn (Diocese of Limerick), Dr. MacEwen, Dr. Cotter, G. McCutchan, A. Isaac, F. Foster, J. S. White, W. Raymoud, - Maginn, W. H. Godfrey, C. Tyner, W. D. Wade, J. Swanzy, R. Beatty, and D. Moriarty. The service was almost entirely choral, the anthem, "I was glad when they said unto me," by Sir G. Elvey, being rendered with great spirit. The lessons were read by Canon Nicholson and Archdeacon Orpen, and a most eloquent sermon was preached by the Lord Bishop of Cork upon the text, Ephesians II., 21. After the sermon the Holy Communion was administered, and a collection taken up to defray the very inconsiderable sum yet required for the restoration of the building. We must not omit to mention that the organ—a remarkably wellmade and happily designed instrument, with two full manuals and 24 stops, built by Messrs Conacher, of Huddersfield-was very skilfully and judiciously manipulated by Mr. H. C. Perrin, organist of St John's, Lowestoft, who also in the afternoon of Wednesday played a selection of sacred music, well calculated to exhibit the capabilities of the instrument. It is blown by hydraulic power, and though, perhaps, to some extent boxed-up in its chamber, combines very considerable power with very great sweetness of tone. The weather was, upon the whole, and considering the lachrymose tendency of Killarney skies, favourable, the few showers that fell being compensated for by cheering intervals of brilliant sunshine.

THE RAILWAY FATALITY.

INQUEST ON THE BODY.

An inquiry into the circumstances connected with the death of David Dalton, whose body was found on the railway at Ballysimon Bridge on Thursday, was held la-t evening in the County Courthouse, by Mr Coroner Cleary and a jury. ceased was a fireman on the line, and when the fatality occurred had charge of a pilot enginewhich was attached to the goods train from Waterford. Mr Glynn watched the case on behalf of the

Waterford and Lim-rick Bailway Company, and Head-Constable M'Caffrey conducted the case on behalf of the police.

Patrick Hickey, guard of the goods train, was first examined. He stated that he left Waterford on Wednesday evening, and deceased was on the same train with him, being on the pilot engine. Deceased was then sober, and the pilot engine had no steam up. That engine would require to be oiled at some of the stations, but witness could not say that it was necessary to oil the engine. After leaving Waterford he next saw the deceased at Pallas station, and did not

then see him again until he sawhim lying on Bally. simon Bridge apparently dead. There was no one with him at any part of the way. Witness did not see him falling off the engine, but a slight mismovement of the van attracted his attention, and on looking out he saw the deceased on the About half way between Ballysimon and Limerick, at witness's direction, the train was stopped, but they did not go back to see him, as it would be an infringement of the rules. Witness observed traces of blood on the engine, and a quantity of brain matter. He could not account for the blood being on the engine except that his

head came in contact with the bridge. To the Foreman—The engine on which deceased travelled was in front of the van on which witness was. It was being removed to Limerick for repairs. Deceased was supposed to travel on this engine, which was fit for traveling without

Joseph Kennedy, engine-driver, stated that he saw deceased lastly at Oola. There were perhaps thirty carriages between witness's engine and the engine on which deceased was. not back the train on the same line, as he would be liable to be prosecuted by the Board of Trade. Deceased was special fireman, and often acted as fireman before. If he fell asleep on the engine the deceased would be liable to fall off. Witness was certain that deceased was not under the influence of liquor.

To the Foreman-Deceased had no occasion to go on the footboard. The engine was in perfect travelling order-that was for running along with the train. As soon as witness noticed the train "clegging" which was caused by the guard applying the brake, witness stopped the train. He had gone about a mile and a half. Deceased could not oil the engine whilst the train was going. He was supposed to oil it when the train stopped. Deceased was about twenty years of

The Coroner—What condition of mind was the deceased in? He seemed to be in good spirits, and was always well conducted. When the train got to Limerick witness immediately got another engine and went back to the place. The train was travelling at about the rate of from 26 to 30 miles an hour. It was more difficult to stop a train having a weighty load than it was to stop a train not heavily loaded. The officials on the train did what they considered best under the circumstances. Deceased's head was smashed, and portion of his brains protruding. Death, in his opinion, must have been instantaneous.

Patrick Dwyer, Ballysimon, stated t the deceased on the bridge, his attention being called to the bedy by a woman who was passing along the road, and who stated there was blood on The deceased was lying face downwards. His position was not altered until the police arrived.

As the body was not examined by a doctor there was no medical testimony.

A verdict was returned to the effect that deceased was found dead, the result of injuries received.
