FLOODS IN CLARE—Much damage has been experienced within the past few weeks by farmers in West Clare, more particularly in the immediate vicinity of Cooraclare, through extensive floods. In some places the public road was impassible for a considerable distance. The recent heavy rains have risen the Fergus and tributaries to a great height, and the river is now considerably swollen.
