FUNERAL OF MR. T. JOYCE.

The remains of Mr Tom Joyce, whose demise at the early age of 37 years we announced in our last issue, were interred yesterday at the new cemetery, where some of his relatives have already been laid at rest. The morning was blustery and inclement, but, nevertheless, a large concourse of friends from the monster houses, as well as a considerable number of the general public, attended to pay the last mark of respect to Mr Joyce's memory—one, indeed, which it will long take to efface in this city where he was so long and favourably known. Mass was celebrated yesterday morning in St Michael's chapel, whither the coffin was borne by some of the employees of Todd and Co., on the previous evening. A short Office was also held by Father O'Shea, a quarter of an hour previous to the funeral. The coffin—a massive oak one with rich brass mountings—was strewn with wreaths, and many others besides were sent by friends from far and near. A beautiful wreath made of natural lilies, carnations, and chrysanthemums, interspersed with maiden-hair fern, was sent by the Drapers Club, and one of similar material was sent by the Shannon Rowing Club. Mrs Andrew Murray sent a cross of natural flowers. Others were sent by the employees and buyers of Messrs Todd and Co., while the ladies of the house contributed a heart-shaped wreath of violets and white flowers. Mrs M'Donagh sent a wreath of carnations, Miss Lee one of natural flowers, and the contributors included also Mrs Ray and Mrs Clements.
