THE ACCUSED RETURNED FOR TRIAL ON THE CHARGE OF MURDER.

At the Ballyneety Petty Sessions to-day, before Major Rolleston, R.M., and Mr Russell, John Hannon was charged caused the death with having wilfully of a young named Kearney at Cahirconlish by stabbing. The testimony of the witnesses who were examined before the coroner's jury, who returned a verdict of wilful murder against Hannon, and the persons examined to-day would convey that the deceased and the accused had some slight dispute about dogs on the day previous to the occurrence, which terminated fatally in about six days afterwards. It is alleged that this unpleasantness was of a most trivial character, Hannon being, as stated, the originator.
