They have, perhaps, neither the time nor the money to spend a week or a month at the seaside, and therefore it is the more incumbent on the community to see hat as much as possible will be done to give them bathing facilities in the river of which they are so justly proud, and that at the same time they need not run the risk of death whilst enjoying this harmless pastime. There have been quite enough victims to convince most people that there is urgent need of consulting the requirements of that class of citizens who find in the fresh water of the river the only available substitute for the invigorating."briny." If these people cannot be provided at public expense (which is really their own expense) with facilities for bathing they ought to be protected from the death traps with which the river unfortunately abounds. We are glad to learn that the matter has been referred to at the Corporation meeting to-day. The sacrifice of twenty lives during the last ten years exceeds the number of killed in some recent British battles, and is a fact that ought not to be without its weight in preventing this annual loss of life. Mr. Ryan has lost no time in handing in a notice of motion in which he proposes to place £480 on the next estimates to provide suitable baths. This will again raise the matter, and we hope it will be satisfactorily arranged without waiting for more victims. In a question of this kind consideration of economy ought not to be everything.
