SAD FATALITY IN THE CITY.

Mr M. J. DeCourcy, City Coroner, and a jury held an inquest this evening in Barrington's Hospital on the body of a boy named John Lovett who met his death this morning under peculiarly melancholy circumstances at the coooperation of Mr Punch, Watergate. Messrs Ryan and Hall, Solrs., represented Mr Punch, and Acting Sergt. Hickey conducted the case on behalf of the Crown. John M'Mahon, a lad in the employment of Mr Punch, gave evidence, that about twelve o'clock to-day he saw the deceased, who was employed as store-carrier to the machines, falling from the roof of the machine room to the floor. He did not hear the deceased say anything, but saw two lads named Hayes run to his assistance. The belt was not moving at the time of the occurrence; but was hanging loose on the shaft. He succumbed shortly after the occurrence.

To a juror—When the belt is not working it is usually tied to the door. It was not tied at this time. It might be moving on the shaft.

Mr Ryan—Did you say to any one afterwards that the deceased was "fiddling" with the belt?

Witness—No, I did not.

Acting-sergeant Hickey—Do you know how the deceased got up to the roof?

Witness—I do not.

Acting-sergeant Hickey—Had he any other means of getting up to the roof except by the belt?

Witness—No; unless he got a ladder, and there was no ladder there.

Several other witnesses were examined, the evidence being of a rather conflicting nature. Some were of opinion that the belt was attached to the machine, and was working at the time, while others testified to the contrary. After a lengthened investigation the jury returned a verdict to the effect that death was accidental, adding a rider that the place should be more guarded.

FIRE IN UPPER WILLIAM STREET.

About ten o'clock on Tuesday night a fire was discovered to have broken out in "the Agricultural House" of Mr Wm M. O'Friel, Upper William street. In a short time, it assumed serious proportions, and threatened to spread to the adjoining buildings. Messrs Deunys's fire brigad, under the control of Mr M. Cummins, was quickly brought on the spot, and shortly after the Corporation engine, in charge of Mr Forrest, arrived.
