DISORDERLY CONDUCT.

John Casey and his wife Maggie Ca-
sary charged by Constable Cragg with hav-
ing been drunk and disorderly on the public
Tuesday evening last. There was a second
charge against the male prisoner of having threat-
ened to take his wife's life.

The Constable gave evidence sustain-
ing the first charge against both, and stated that
he pulled a razor out of his pocket, and threat-
ened "to take Maggie's" life.

The woman denied that her husband
did anything of the kind.

For the first offence Casey was order-
ed to be imprisoned for one month, and a fur-
ther term of two months was ordered for the
second offence.

Mr Casey, for being drunk and disor-
derly, was sentenced to a month's imprisonment.

Mr Counihan, solicitor, applied to
have men named respectively Fitzgibbon and
Cahill, who were in custody on a charge of as-
sault, and a man named Sheedy admitted to bail.

The application was resisted by the
prosecution, on the grounds that no medical certificate
had been obtained that the man's life was out of
danger.

Mr Counihan said the doctor would
give a certificate without getting paid for it.

The Bench decided that bail would be
granted, on condition that a certificate to the effect that
the man's life was out of danger would be produced.

A number of unimportant cases have
been disposed of, the court adjourned.

When the Emperor William, who re-
