DEATH OF MR J W MORAN.

We sincerely regret to record the rather sud- den and unexpected demise, which has taken place at his residence, George street, of Mr J W Moran, the managing director of Messrs Cannock and Company, Limited, of which he was also a large shareholder. Mr Moran had suffered from a cold for the past few weeks, but yet re- mained at business until Saturday last, after which date he was confined to his bed. However, hopes of his recovery were entertained notwith- standing his somewhat critical condition, until early this morning when very dangerous symptoms set in, and Mr Moran a few hours afterwards passed away. That his death is much regretted by the citizes, not to speak of his immediate relatives and friends is shown by the universal tokens of sympathy which he met within in every thoroughfare to-day. The deceased gentleman was for nineteen years connected with Messrs Cannock and Company, for over five of which he had been managing director, and the tact and business capacity with which he dis- charged his very onerous duties were ever the subject of praise at the meetings of the share- holders. To the public he was always most courteous and obliging, and by them alone his loss will long be felt. Indeed, it will be difficult to fill the void which Mr Moran's death creates. We may add that Mr Moran was also principal proprietor of the City Bakery Company. Can- nock's and the other monster houses had their show windows partly closed to day as a mark of condolence, and on two of the establishments (Cannock's and M'Inerney's) the flags floated half mast high. The funeral takes place on Monday next at ten o'clock for the New Cemetery.
