## DEATH OF THE VERY REV. FATHER O'CONNELL, C.SS.R.

It is with much regret we record the very sudden demise of the Very Rev Father O'Connell, Rector of the Redemptorist Order in Limerick, which took place at the Convent of the church, this afternoon. It would seem that the rev. gentleman had been attending to his religious duties as usual from early morn to noon, when he suddenly became prostrated with apoplexy and got paralysis in the right side. He was barely able to motion to one of the vergers, who bore him into the Convent, and medical aid was quickest summoned with the despatch. Drs Kane and Malone were with Father O'Connell immediately, but all that their experionced skill could suggest was of no avail, the Rev gentleman having passed away this afternoon at five o'clock to the inexpressible grief of the members of his order. Father O'Connell who, in the early years of his ministry was a secular priest, was for five years Rector of St Alphonsus, having succeeded the Rev Father He was one of the most popular clergymen in the city, beloved by his flock, and highly respected by all who knew him irrespective of class or creed. ## DEATH OF AN EMINENT LIMERICK MAN.

The Evening Telegraph says: - The death of our distinguished countryman, Sir W O'Shaughnessy Brooke, Director-General of Telegraphs in India. is deserving of something more than a mere passing notice. William O'Shaughnessy was born in Limerick in the year 1809, and selected medicine as a profession, for the study of which he entered the Edinburgh University, where, in 1832, he graduated; and in the following year he entered the medical service of the Hon. East Indian Company. He quickly applied himself to the study of native remedies, and corresponded frequently with the late Dr O'Donovan, of Clare street, under whose notice he brought the medicinal properties of Indian hemp and other drugs. Sir William's most important work was done in connection with the Indian telegraph system, for which, in 1856, he received his knighthood. He did not, however, disassociate himself from medicine, and in the preparation of the Indian Pharmacop a he took an active part. In 1861, by Royal licence, he assumed the name of Brooke, but he will be better remembered by the name of O'Shaughnessy, a name by which Pereire and all our standard works on the rapeutics has mad-familiar to the medical profession through out the world.
