DEATH OF MRS O'DWYER.

We regret to record the death, after a long
 illness, of Mrs O'Dwyer, mother of the Most
 Rev Dr O'Dwyer, R.C. Bishop of Limerick. The
 sad event took place yesterday morning at No. 8,
 Glentworth-street, the residence of the deceased
 lady. His Lordship was frequently at the bed-
 side during her last illness, as was also his
 sister—Sister Mary Gonzaga, of the Order of
 Charity, Banbury. Mrs O'Dwyer, who had at-
 tained the ripe age of 78 years, was the relict of
 the late John C. Keatinge O'Dwyer, Esq. formerly
 of Cullen, Tipperary, and sister of a well-known
 merchant of Limerick in former years, the late
 Ald Laurence Quinliyan, J.P., who was Mayor of
 the city in 1850, and subsequently High Sheriff.
 Mrs O'Dwyer was of a very sympathetic and
 charitable disposition, and showed it in a practi-
 cal manner by the interest she took in various
 works of charity, both in the city and outside it.
 She was beloved by all who knew her, and for
 the Bishop much sympathy is everywhere ex-
 pressed in his bereavement. The remains of the
 deceased lady will be conveyed to St. Michael's
 chapel, and on Saturday morning there will be a
 Solemn Requiem Mass for the repose of her
 soul, commencing at nine o'clock, after which
 the funeral will leave for Mount St. Lawrence
 Cemetery.

 in the happiness she felt at seeing her son the
 Bishop of his native city and county, and to-day
 they sorrowed with his Lordship in the loss of that
