The Board made an order to the effect that the amount 2s 6d was charged in order to prevent the practice, which the Guardians believed prevailed, of tendering under an assumed name.

FINANCIAL STATE OF THE HOUSE.

The Clerk (Mr Coll) announced that there was £1,172 cheques outstanding.

Mr McDonald said it was most satisfactory that the outstanding cheques should be shown.

Mr Coll said that £1,800 would be paid to the Board when the cottages were finished. It would not take £200 to finish them.

The matter was not further discussed.

THE SCHOOLMASTER'S CHARGE AGAINST THE MASTER.

Another letter, comprising nearly two sides of foolscap paper, was read from the schoolmaster with reference to his charge of alleged abusive language against the master. The letter requested the guardians to consider the case fully, and to hold an inquiry into the whole matter.

The Board agreed to send the whole case on the minutes to the Local Government Board for their decision.

THE FRANCHISE ACT.

A letter was read from Mr Martin W. Carroll, rate collector, asking for the sum of £20 for expenses incurred under the Franchise Act, in the year 1887. Owing to the financial state of the union, he did not press for the money, and did not know that Mr Bolster, the late Clerk, had got the money. He said that he had to pay the costs and expenses of administering the Act out of his own pocket.

After a few remarks, the guardians agreed to ask the Local Government Board whether the guardians were legally bound to pay the money to Mr Carroll.

NOTICE OF MOTION.

A notice of motion was handed in last Thursday week, proposing to increase the salary of the midwife in the Kilmacna Dispersary District, from £20 to £25, and Mr D. Condon now moved it.

No opposition being at hand, it was granted.

The same guardian moved on a fortnight's notice of motion already given, that a woman named Kelly, living in the Glenbrohane Electoral Division, be granted £12 to assist her and her five children to go to America.

It was granted, her own passage and one of her daughters having been paid by her husband, who is in America, and the £12 is required for the other five children.

CORK BOARD OF GUARDIANS.

At the meeting of the Cork Board of Guardians on Thursday—Mr H. L. Young presiding—a letter was read from the Local Government Board, enclosing one they had received from Alderman Scott with reference to the proceedings of the board on the previous Thursday, in which that gentleman stated that the ratepayers looked to the Local Government Board to protect their interests.

Mr Ahern proposed that Alderman Scott be requested to send up to the Local Government Board the text of the resolution which caused the discussion on the previous board day, as it was a perfectly legal course to condemn the conduct of Mr Smith-Barry for attempting to evict a country side, and for the imprisonment of Mr William O'Brien.

After some discussion, the matter was ended by the chairman refusing to receive the resolution.
