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Lordship the Most tinlivan, PP, Kilkee. DEATH OF MR. ROBERT REEVES. Q.C.

The legal profession in Limerick and the public generally have heard with regret of the death of Mr. Robert Reeves, Q.C., which took place on Thursday morning at his residence, Ely Place, Dublin, at the age of 56 years. The deceased gentleman was called to the Bar in the Michaelmas term of 1857, and applied bimself to the practice of the law with great earnestness, winning distinction principally in equity, in which branch his opinion was always looked for in complicated cases. In 1880 he was appointed Queen's Connsel, and soon after the passing of the Land Aot of was offered the position of legal subcommissioner, which he accepted and filed up to the time of his death with dignity and impartiality. He was, we believe, the Chairman of the first Sub-Commission which sat in Limerick, and with his colleagues. Mr O'Keeffe, Mr Rice, and others, disposed of many important test cases under the Land Act during his stay in Limerick and Clore. For some three years or so, however, Mr Reeves had exclusively been engaged in the Midland and other districts. He was a gentleman of a most courteous disposition, giving a fair and considerate hearing to everyone who came before him, 'no matter what his position' might be, and he was highly respected by all who knew bim. In private life Mr Reeves was a great favourite. He was deeply interested in the study of music; and was very much appreciated in musical circles in Dublin. His genial and social qualities gained for him the respect of all who knew him, and his death will be deeply mourned by an extensive circle of acquaintances. The funeral will have for Mount Jerome Cemetery on Monday morning next.
