THE DEPARTURE OF THE TAMAR—Her Majesty's troopship Tamar arrived at Queenstown yesterday morning from Portsmouth, and came alongside the deep-water quay, where she embarked three officers and 166 men, some women and children, and proceeded for the Mediterranean ports at 3 p.m. She takes out Colonel Stenenson, Royal Highlanders, and a few military details for Gibraltar; a draft for the 37th Battery Southern Division Royal Artillery, under Major Biddell; a draft for the 2nd Border Regiment at Malta; a draft for the 2nd Scots Borderers, under Captain Claughton; and other details for Alexandria, and a few passengers for Cyprus. Her total list is 26 officers, 678 men, 44 women and 60 children.
