

MISCELLANEOUS.

Loss to the amount of £35,000 was caused by a fire at the Royal Mills, Halifax, to-day.

At Hammersmith to-day, Charles Mills, bookseller, Fulham, was remanded, charged with causing the death of his wife by striking her on the head with his fist.

Further evictions were carried on yesterday at Luggacurran. The resistance offered was slight. Sixteen tenants have now been evicted. Operations will be resumed on Friday.

A number of men charged with participation in the ploughing up of crops on farms on the Ponsonby estate were brought yesterday before the resident magistrates at Youghal, who dismissed the charges against several, but sentenced one who had been actually engaged in ploughing up corn to three months' imprisonment, and another who endeavoured to persuade a man not to give his name to the police to six weeks' imprisonment. The charge against a Cork reporter of being a member of an unlawful assembly on the occasion was withdrawn.
