At the last meeting of the Ballyvaughan Board of Guardians—Mr William Lane Joynt, D.L., presiding—Mr O.Loughlan proposed—"That the Local Government Board be requested to unite the Ballyvaughan Union with the unions of Corofin, Ennistymon, and Gort, for the relief of the rate-payers, and for the establishment of an industrial school for the instruction of the pauper children in useful trades."
