DEATH OF MR ROBERT HOLMES, P.L.G.—We
much regret to announce the death, after a very
short illness, of Mr Robert Holmes, P.L.G.,
which took place at his residence Athlunkard
early on yesterday morning. Mr Holmes had
attained the ripe age of eighty-one years, and
possessed remarkably good health up to the last
couple of weeks. He was a very large farmer,
and his name was well-known in this and the
adjoining counties. He was a member of the
Board of Guardians of Limerick Union for a great
many years, and gave his best attention at all
times to the interests of those whom he repre-
sented. His death will be much regretted by all
who had the pleasure of knowing him. The
guardians adjourned their meeting yesterday as
a mark of respect to his memory. The interment
takes place at Parteen on Friday at eleven
o'clock.

WORKHOUSE AMALGAMATION.—At the last
meeting of the Ballyvaughan Board of Guardians
—Mr William Lane Joynt, D.L., presiding—Mr
O'Loughlan proposed—"That the Local Go-
vernment Board be requested to unite the Bally-
vaughan Union with the unions of Corofin,
Ennistymon, and Gort, for the relief of the rate-
payers, and for the establishment of an industrial
school for the instruction of the pauper children

sidered it a very great hardship on his division
(Carron) to have to contribute £200 to the rates
