INQUEST.

An inquest was held this evening by Mr Coroner DeCourcy, and a respectable jury, of which Mr W. Coll, was foreman, on the body of a child named Agnes Mary Carroll, whose death occurred yesterday. About two months ago the deceased was alleged to have been injured through the negligence of a driver in the employment of Mr Kenna, and it was considered necessary to investigate the circumstances connected with the death. The evidence given, however, went to convey that although the child was knocked down by a 'bus belonging to Mr Kenna, there was no negligence exhibited on the part of the driver, who did everything in his power to save the child from injury. The medical testimony, given by Dr O'Sullivan, was to the effect that death resulted from disease of the kidneys. He expressed the belief that the occurrence did not in any way accelerate or affect the child's death. The jury returned a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony, attaching no blame to the driver. Sergeant Storey, Colcooney st, conducted the case on behalf of the Crown, and Mr P. S. Connolly, solicitor, watched the proceedings on behalf of Mr Kenna.
