

able. He said the Treasury contribution would take effect until the line was opened. Mr. Leonard, in reply to Mr. Leonard, gave the names of the gentlemen who promoted the line, which included Lord Lansdowne and Archibald Hillman.

Mr. Trench proposed the following resolution: "That we approve of the railway proposed by the Kenmare Light Railway Company, Limited, and that we do hereby guarantee for the sum of £60,000 at £100 per annum, provided that the Treasury grant of £50,000 towards the project, should be put into the shape of a formal contract, in pursuance of the Tramways Act and Railway Act, of 1880; also that Mr. Trench's plotment, and subject to the conditions of the Grand Jury shall require in the future."

Mr. Corkery seconded the resolution, which was unanimously adopted.

The honorable discussion then followed as to the conditions to be imposed in the entire development of the project, and the following resolution was adopted unanimously on the proposition of Mr. Trench, seconded by Mr. Hewson; the committee, consisting of Mr. Hewson, Mr. M'Clure, and Mr. Townsend, were appointed to instruct the solicitor who was to appear before the Privy Council, and that in relation to the committee to instruct the solicitor to oppose the project unless an agreement was reached substantially in accord with the draft submitted to the Grand Jury, be agreed to with the following resolution:

Resolved: "That the following resolution be adopted:—  
 That a guarantee of 4 per cent on £60,000 towards the construction of the Kenmare and Headfort Railway be granted on the condition, and to become operative when the Treasury grant of £50,000 towards the construction; and, secondly, that a workable railway be made, which shall be approved by the Privy Council."  
 The Grand Jury then adjourned.
