Mr. Chamberlain's bill as it stood to be the first ever made for the settlement of the difficulty, and as far as he concerned all he urged upon the Government to insert a simple clause in the bill to provide that when County Councils were established in Ireland, then these Councils should have important functions in regard to the administration of the Local Government for Ireland. It could not be brought on the session. When the County Councils were established the mode of operation follows: "When a landlord has agreed for the sale and purchase of land they should apply for the County Council. If that is not done, then the matter would go to the Land Commission, who would consider the security and conditions and if they were satisfied the landlord should advance the rents, and pay over to the County Council that portion of the rent which is retained for interest and repayment of the balance for its own use, and if there was any deficiency in the amount the County Council would be bound to make good; and if it did not make good the Government would be entitled to recover the necessary amount from the landlord, which would otherwise go from the County Councils for local purposes. Mr. Chamberlain's scheme, he thought, would be a great benefit to the tenants, and by its adoption would dispose of the bill against the bill that local Councils should be created in this country, and have no voice in dispensing with the security which was to provide
