#### DEATH OF MR. GAMALIEL McGRATH FITZGERALD.

We regret to announce the death of Mr Gamaliel M. Fitzgerald, which took place yesterday morning at his residence, 64, George street, where he had lived for considerably over half a century. Mr Fitzgerald, who was the last surviving son of the late Rev Wyndham McGrath Fitzgerald, was a worthy representative of one of the oldest Limerick families, and was remarkable for his kind and genial manner, while his charitable acts are thoroughly well known. He was born at Strand House, Limerick, in 1812, and for about fifty years was agent to the Dunraven family, during which time the relations between himself and the tenants were of the most cordial character, as evidenced by the feelings of regret which were expressed by them on his retirement from the office some eight years ago. Mr Fitzgerald had the management of other properties, in the administration of which he was ably assisted by Mr John Guinane, J.P., and the deceased gentleman possessed an estate of his own in this county. He had been in delicate health for a considerable time past, but still went out for his customary drive up to a few days ago. Mr Fitzgerald's demise is much regretted, and his name will long be remembered with affection in his native city and county. The funeral will leave George-street on Saturday morning at nine o'clock for interment in the family vault at Emly.
