THE ALLEGED LIBEL EUSTON

At the Old Bailey, this morning Hawkins summed up the evidence against Ernest Parke for publishing a libel on Lord Euston. He said the question was whether the defendant pleaded a plea of justification. It matters whether others had committed these libels. The Judge expressed approval of the prosecution in not calling the end of defendant's case. Lord Euston would not have known his Lordship pointed out that the defence had not removed Lord Euston's height, but had described him as a creature of much less stature.
