## THE LONDON SCANDAL.

THE ALLEGED LIBEL ON LORD EUSTON.

At the Old Bailey, this morning, Mr. Hawkins summed up the evidence for Ernest Parke for publishing the libel on Lord Euston. He said the question was whether the defendant had a good plea of justification. It may be asked, what others had committed these libels? The Judge expressed approval of the prosecution in not calling the end of defendant's case. Lord Euston would not have known it. His Lordship pointed out that the defence had not rung up Euston's height, but had described him as of much less stature. As to the revolting creature Saul, the judge believed—him or Lord Euston—who was now in gaol, and who had been in the house when Lord Euston had not been called. The same applies to all the inmates of Clerkenwell. It was inexpedient and unjust to reflect upon individuals.
