THE LAHINCH SEA WALL.

A meeting was held at Kern's Hotel, Lahinch, on Sunday last for the purpose of taking steps to build the battlement.

Mr C. S. Cahill, C.E., occupied the chair, and John McInerney, Ennistymon, was appointed secretary.

Mr Spellacy spoke some words of advice and encouragement, after which the following resolutions were unanimously adopted:—

Proposed by Mr T. McCormack, and seconded by Mr D. Vaughan—"That we, the representatives of the inhabitants of Lahinch, view with some regret the present dilapidated and unimproved condition of the sea wall, and request the consideration of all concerned, in remedying this state of affairs by the erection of a substantial breakwater."

Proposed by Mr J. McInerney, and seconded by Mr M. Rush—"That we earnestly and respectfully request our county members to urgently present our claims in the proper quarter, with a view of obtaining a grant to erect a breakwater at Lahinch. The inroads of the sea are daily becoming more alarming, and will inevitably result in wholesale destruction of life and property if immediate action be not taken in the future."

Proposed by Mr Michael Horan, P.L.G., and seconded by Mr J. Sharry—"That owing to the appalling distress, consequent on the almost total failure of the potato crop, this project is most desirable, as it would tend to alleviate the distress among the labouring classes in this district, and thereby avert a recurrence of the appalling scenes witnessed during famine years like the past."

A warm vote of thanks to the chairman was given, and the meeting adjourned.
