#### DEATH OF MR WILLIAM HEFFERNAN.

We record with sincere regret the premature  
and unexpected demise of Mr William Heffernan

#### COURT OF INQUIRY TO ASSESS DAMAGES.

A court of inquiry was held to-day in the City  
Courthouse, before Mr C. H. Fitt, City Sub-Sheriff  
and a common jury, for the purpose of assessing  
damages in the case of Cornelius Conway against  
Mary Conway. The action was brought by the  
plaintiff, who is a mineral water manufacturer,  
residing at Sexton-street, Limerick, as adminis-  
trator of the late John Conway, against the de-  
fendant, Mary Conway, his daughter-in-law,  
Tipperary, for trover, conversion, and detinue of a  
quantity of machinery and plant, a horse and  
van, and a donkey and cart, also some house  
furniture. The defendant entered "no appear-  
ance" on the writ of summons on the delivery of  
the statement of claim by the plaintiff, and al-  
lowed judgment to go by default. Mr R. B.  
Barry, B.L. (instructed by Mr J. H. Moran, sol.),  
appeared for the plaintiff. After hearing evi-  
dence, and Mr Moran having proved the letters of  
administration, the jury found a verdict for £80,  
the full amount claimed.
