DEATH OF MR GEORGE HOBSON.

It is with deep regret we observe in our obituary column the announcement of the death of the above young gentleman, fourth son of the late William Doyle Hobson, Esq., of Maylass Park, Wexford, and brother of Mr F. St. M. Hobson of Lonsdrone, Sub-sheriff for this county. The painful and tragic circumstances of his death must excite general commiseration. It is supposed that the evil passions of some of his native servants having been aroused through the trivial reason of Mr Hobson's refusal of his gun to one of them, they took advantage of his unsuspecting character to murder him while asleep. We quote the following from the *Cairns Argus*:—"The deceased, though so young, had seen considerable service as a soldier in the Cape Mounted Police, serving from 1877 to 1883 in the Zulu and other wars, and was on several occasions creditably mentioned in the despatches for his pluck and undaunted bravery. He was twice wounded, and received two medals and his commission for bravery in action, ranking as lieutenant and adjutant, when peace caused the disbandment of the Colonial forces. He arrived in Cairns six years ago, and had for some time been managing his brother's (Mr W. Doyle Hobson) selection at Myola. The deceased was much respected and universally liked." The greatest sympathy is expressed with Mr Hobson's family in their sad and extremely painful bereavement.

MEETING OF THE LOCOMOTIVE EMPLOYEES OF THE W.

ADDRESS BY MR FOREMAN.

Last night a largely attended meeting of the employees in the Locomotive Department of the Waterford and Limerick Railway, who were on strike, was held in the Town Hall. The meeting was addressed by Mr Foreman, of the Amalgamated Union.

Mr E. O'Connor presided, and in his address proposed that there would be a meeting for their future guidance, and that it was necessary that these should be because it was by the passing of resolutions they would adopt now that for themselves such a union that in a sense their relations in future Company.

Mr Whelan then proposed a resolution of gratification at the satisfaction of the strike, and hoping that there would be a harmonious character, and that the time had arrived when the Locomotive I should be amalgamated in one trade, recommending that the strike committee should remain in office until such a union was formed.

Mr Foreman, in supporting the resolution, said the men were not afraid, and that they would not be the want of a cause they might struggle, but it would be for the benefit of the cause. He was glad they took courage, and that they had got assistance from other workers, which enabled them to achieve a great success that day if he could have ment a satisfactory one for the Locomotive Company. He declared without hesitation that he had every reason for congratulating the men, and he had to offer them his congratulations on the success that had attended the strike, and that £500 had been conceded, which meant half of what they originally demanded. He did not see why the relations between the company and the men should not be of a harmonious character. The men of the strike, could be contributing so much to the welfare of the country, and he could tell them this with every sympathy with the men. He was very glad that they had won their cause, and that there was no need for the men or the Locomotive Company to engender any bitterness against one another. On the other hand, the Locomotive Company could respect them in the same way they conducted themselves, and that they had demonstrated to the world that they would stand by each other, and were willing to make sacrifices in a just cause.
