**CITY POLICE COURT.—YESTERDAY.**

A young man named Patrick Moloney was  
charged at the instance of Sergeant Griffin with  
having stabbed a man named John Farrell, on  
the previous night.  
The Sergeant stated he arrested the accused  
from information received, and then proceeded  
to Barrington's Hospital. He found that Farrell  
had a cut over the left eye, which was apparently  
inflicted with a knife. He applied for a remand,  
believing he could procure evidence to sustain  
the charge.

The accused was remanded to Petty Sessions.  
Edward O'Flanagan was fined 6d and costs for  
drunkenness. He was found in the street by  
night watch.

**SAD CASE OF SUICIDE.**  
A young girl named Johanna Hogan, a farm  
servant, committed suicide on Sunday by hang-  
ing herself. The unfortunate young woman was  
in the employment of a respectable farmer  
named Patrick Hayes, Crossagalla. Early in the  
morning she left the house for the purpose of  
hearing Mass, and it is stated she received Holy  
Communion. In about two hours later she re-  
turned, and proceeded with her ordinary business.  
She appeared in her usual spirits, apparently  
gay and cheerful, and nothing unusual was  
noticeable about her demeanour. About  
two o'clock in the afternoon, her mis-  
tress, considering she remained out an unusual  
length of time, went in search of her, calling her  
by her name. After having searched for some  
time Mrs Hayes went into the cow-house, and was  
shocked to find the young woman suspended  
from the rafters with a rope round her neck.  
On examination it was found that she was quite  
dead. The arrangements for the carrying out of

the belief that the act was a deliberate and pre-  
meditated one. The deceased was about 23 years  
of age, and was of most industrious habits. She  
never exhibited any symptoms of insanity, and no  
motive can be assigned for the act. An inquest  
was held yesterday.
