MELANCHOLY DEATH OF A PORK BUTCHER.—Mr Coroner DeCourcy, with a jury, held an inquest at Mr Hickey's publichouse, Mungret-street, yesterday, touching the death of John O'Mara, Pork Butcher, of Mungret-street, which took place at Barrington's Hospital on Sunday. According to the evidence of Mary O'Mara, wife of the deceased, it would appear that he had not been of sound mind lately as he was frequently making foolish statements. On Saturday evening she heard a noise upstairs and on going there he asked her to send for the priest. Subsequently she heard noise again, and on proceeding once more to the room she saw deceased lying on the flags underneath. Medical evidence having been given, the jury found a verdict that death was due to the injuries received on the occasion. Deceased sustained some bad wounds on the head.
