THE LATE DROWNING ACCIDENT AT KILKEE.

The funeral obsequies of the late Master Charles M'Sweeney, who was accidentally drowned while bathing at Kilkee on Tuesday last, took place yesterday. The remains, which were discovered a day or two after the sad event, were removed to Limerick, and the interment took place at the Redemptorist Church, where High Mass was celebrated by the Rev Father Murray, assisted by the Rev Fathers Lanley, Hall, and Magnier. After Mass the funeral procession was formed, being composed of the deceased's relatives and his companions in study, and a large number of the clergy and laity of the city. What if a dip in the briny entailed difficulties and dangers beyond any he has yet encountered. There has been no bathing this year at Edmund point, because there is no ladder there. The ladder presented to the bathers of Kilkee seems to be in the possession of a smith and a shopkeeper. I offered the smith ten shillings for replacing it and fastening with a bolt and nut. He gladly accepted this and promised to do it at once. After a few days he said he could not do it unless a shopkeeper whom he named got five shillings. As I saw no reason for this, I refused. The visitors are therefore driven to bathe where they can. The young gentleman who lately lost his life went with others to the dangerous spot called Goolen Bay. This is an example of the care bestowed on the visitors by those living by them. The railway is expected to do great things for Kilkee. I don't believe it.
