FUNERAL OF MR. ROBERT NUGENT HUMBLE, M.F.H.

The interment of this much regretted and
most popular sportsman and country gentleman
took place on Tuesday at Abbeyside Grave-
yard, adjoining the town of Dungarvan, in
the family burying-place, within the walls of the
ancient church of that place, in which his ances-
tors have been buried for the last six hundred
years.

The cortege left the family seat at Cloncos-
keraine at a quarter past 1 p.m., being delayed so
late at the special desire of many friends from
Limerick, Fermoy, and Waterford, who were de-
pendent on train accommodation, and was fol-
lowed by an immense concourse of the neighbour-
ing peasantry and citizens of Dungarvan, as well
as the gentry of the surrounding districts and the
Roman Catholic clergy of the parish.
