HOUSE AT CHISWICK.—In a paragraph attention to the present condition of the house at Chiswick, it is stated as a sad state of dilapidation, showing injuries, a hole in the roof, and signs of ruinous neglect. The house (the Builder) abuts against the left-hand side of Hogarth-lane, leading from the Duke of Devonshire's villa, and Hogarth bought it shortly after his visit to Calais; he occupied it as a residence until his death, on October 26, 1764, in the cemetery-fields. In this same house lived Mary, the translator of Dante; who, with her husband and his wife, was buried in Chiswick churchyard. The Hogarth tomb, bearing an inscription as amended by Dr Johnson, was erected by a Scotsman, namesake of him, and is a fine specimen of his kindred morals charm the mind," in 1764, writing thirty years ago, "a mulberry tree as still standing in the garden, but he found that the three on which Hogarth commemorated his name had disappeared, and his painting had been dismantled. At Chiswick Hogarth spent the last few months of his life in directing the removal of some of his plates.
