CORONER'S INQUEST.—On Tuesday, Mr Coroner Cleary held an inquest touching the death of a farmer named Matthew O'Keeffe, who died suddenly at his residence at Pusth, near Cahircorlish, on Sunday night. It appeared from the evidence that on that night the deceased retired to bed in his usual health, which was good, and at about three o'clock his wife hearing him snoring heavily, became alarmed, and endeavoured to arouse him, but he died immediately. Dr Connolly having been examined, the jury returned a verdict that death was due to apoplexy.
