WANTON OUTRAGE.—We regret to learn that a malicious and wanton outrage has been committed on the Parish Church of Clare Abbey. On opening the building on Sunday last for the performance of Divine Service it was discovered that about twenty panes of glass had been broken from without. The animus of the miscreants is shown by the fact that those in the east window were smashed by the insertion of some narrow instrument between the wires of the usual protecting screen. A claim for compensation has been lodged by the Rev J. H. Griffith, Rector. This is the second attack on the same building, as in the early summer a number of road-metal stones were discovered underneath this window, and which had rebounded from the screen without having done serious damage.

THE LATE MR JOSEPH O'SHAUGHNESSY, J.P.—At the Newcastle West Petty Sessions yesterday before Major Rolleston, R.M., and Mr J. W. O'Grady, the following resolution was passed:— "We, the magistrates assembled at Newcastle West Petty Sessions, this 21st day of November, 1890, wish to place on record our deep sorrow at the death of Mr Joseph O'Shaughnessy, one of the magistrates of our district, whose loss we regard as a great public calamity. We ever found him to be a man of the utmost impartiality and honesty of purpose, and we shall greatly miss his assistance in this court. We also direct our clerk to forward a copy of this resolution to Mrs O'Shaughnessy, at the same time expressing our deep sympathy with her in her grievous affliction. Signed, C. H. Rolleston, R.M.; J. W. O'Grady, J.P." The court adjourned without transacting any business, as a mark of respect to Mr O'Shaughnessy's memory.

The *Jewish Chronicle* is enabled to state that the funeral of Lady Rothschild will take place on Tuesday next, at the Jewish Cemetery, where she will be buried in the family plot. Every detail of the Jewish rite will be scrupulously observed.

Mr Arnold Forster, Unionist Member for West Belfast, addressed last night a meeting of Loyalist electors of that city, held at the Hall, under the presidency of Mr J. W. O'Grady. A resolution was passed pledging the support of arms to the last extremity by legislative enactment or otherwise, under the domination of implacable enemies.

THE SWEATING SYSTEM.—It is recalled by the inquiry into the sweating system that a crowded meeting, largely composed of workmen, assembled at the Westminster Hall to establish a Consumers' League, and to pledge themselves to buy only of those who pay a fair price for labour. A resolution to this effect was proposed by the Rev A. W. Jephson and adopted. Another motion was agreed to provide that a list of fair employers in all branches of the trade should be published. The Rev Canon Scott-Holland proposed that the Rev Canon Black and Mr F. J. O'Connell should be appointed to represent the trade-union association.
