It was stated that the grand jury kept the roads so badly that two of the commissioners took the contract themselves and could do them for £100 less than formerly, besides doing them better. They considered the town was overtaxed, and getting very little for the taxation, and at the presentment Sessions all schemes for the improvement of the town were voted down by the associated cesspayers, who were farmers. The Commissioners, therefore, asked that, in consequence of their contributions to the neighbouring baronies, they should be entitled to have two representatives among the associated cesspayers. They also asked that in addition to the one shilling rate which they are entitled to levy, they should have power to levy, if necessary, four shillings more. Nobody appeared to oppose, and after a vote of thanks to the Inspector, the inquiry closed.
