County Petry Sessions.—The magistrates presiding at the County Petty Sessions to-day were Messrs. J. B. Irwin, R.M., and Wm. F. O'Grady. A woman named Mary Mason was charged with the larceny of a sheet and bolster case, the property of John Malone, labourer, Ballysimon. Sergeant Whelan having given evidence as to the arrest of the prisoner and the recovery of the goods, the accused in her defence disclaimed any intention of larceny, alleging that the articles by some unexplained means became attached to the bag which she had used for the purpose of carrying potatoes. The magistrates could not credit her version of the story and ordered a month's imprisonment. Wm. Behan was fined 10s and costs for drunkenness while in charge of a horse and cart. A few unimportant cases having been disposed of, the court adjourned until Thursday week.

DEATH OF MR HAMPDEN WILLIAM RUSSELL.

We regret to announce the death of Mr. Hampden William Russell, which took place on Sunday last at the Imperial Hotel, Catherine street, after a protracted illness.
