at the rate of £375. He reduced the rate on Moyarta from 3s 8d to 2s 11d; Moveen from 4s 5d to 3s; Kilballyowen, from 3s 11d to 3s 1d; Tullig, from 3s 4d to 2s 8d; and Rahona, from 5s 2d to 3s 8d. But it would be a proportionately higher rate for the next year.

The estimates were then passed after some further discussion.

Mr O'Brien moved a notice of motion that it being a 12 months' rate, that the collectors for the first four months get 6d in the £, and for the second four months 4d, and nothing after. Any collector then not having his warrants sent in by the 29th September a resolution be passed calling on the Local Government Board to dismiss him by sealed order.

Mr Burke, inspector, said he found the same experiment succeed in other Unions. He would send in a detailed report saying that the Guardians were evidently turning over a new leaf, and were trying to place the Union in a firm financial condition.

ALLEGED CHILD MURDER IN COUNTY LIMERICK.

Mr John S. Casey, Coroner for Co Limerick, held an inquest at Sunville, near Kilfinane, on Saturday evening on the body of an infant found in a pond at Sunville. A young woman named Elizabeth Sullivan, a domestic servant, has been arrested and lodged in Kilfinane Gaol, charged with causing the death of the infant. At the inquest District Inspector Magee, Kilfinane, deposed that on Thursday morning last, acting on information received, he visited Elizabeth Sullivan, who confessed that she had given birth to an illegitimate male child. She said it died after birth, and she then threw it into a pond, where the body was found. A verdict of death from suffocation was returned.
