KILLALOE CHOIR FESTIVAL.—The Killaloe Choir Festival will be held on Wednesday, July 1st. The preacher will be the Very Rev Dr Campbell, Dean of Dromore. The music appointed is as follows:—Opening hymn, 283, psalms cvii, cxxxiv, and cc; Magnificat and Nunc Dimittis, Tours in E; anthem, "Great is the Lord," Sydenham; hymns, 192, 341, 60; Tallis' Responses and Stainer's, Sevenfold Amen. A special train will run from Birr, and cheap tickets will be issued thence, and from all the intermediate stations to Killaloe.

THE IRISHTOWN WARD.—The death of our late respected and lamented fellow-citizen, Mr John Ryan, T.C., has occasioned a vacancy in the representation of the Irishtown Ward. There are two candidates for the office, Mr Patrick Franklin, publican, of Broad street, who is a Parnellite, and Mr Edward Clifford, pawnbroker, also of Broad street, who is a member of the Irish National Federation. Both candidates have good prospects of election, and there is much lively canvassing. No date of nomination is as yet decided upon.

DEATH OF MR CHARLES DOYLE.—It is with feelings of sincere regret that we record the death of Mr Charles Doyle in Dublin. The deceased gentleman, who was a brother to our late lamented fellow-citizen, Mr Daniel Doyle, solicitor, was extremely popular amongst his numerous Limerick friends, and not indeed without just reason, as his affability marked him wherever he went. His remains, which arrived from Dublin yesterday, have been deposited in their last resting place in Mount St Laurence Cemetery, and were followed thither by many sorrowing friends.

THE GATHOLIC LITERARY INSTITUTE.—That portion of the above institution which was destroyed by fire in January last is to be rebuilt on a thoroughly new design, the council of the institution having met, and re-opened tenders for the purpose on last Monday night. Temporary premises in George street will be engaged during structural operations. The tender of Mr John Hayes, builder, on the plans of Mr J. J. Browne, C.E., architect, has been accepted for a sum of £1,440. The edifice to be finished in five months' time. Other local firms tendered, and one amongst the number was no less than 2400 higher than that of Mr Hayes.

A DISTINGUISHED COUNTY LIMERICK MAN.—Amongst the Royal Birthday honours conferred by Her Majesty is one accorded to Captain W. R. Yeilding, of the India Staff Corps, for distinguished services. He served under General Sir F. Roberts through the Afghan campaign, was at the battle of Cabul, which was followed by the memorable and brilliant march on Candahar, culminating in the important and decisive action fought there, for which Captain Yeilding holds the medal and clasps. He was subsequently attached to the successful Black Mountain Expedition. It will interest many of our readers to learn that Captain Yeilding is a County Limerick man, and we congratulate him on the distinction paid him, which his services so well deserve.

VISIT TO MESSRS. WM. O'BRIEN, M.P., AND JOHN DILLON, M.P.—The Mayor (Ald. P. Jordan) and Mr John Guinane, J.P., have visited Messrs. O'Brien and Dillon in Galway Gaol, where they are undergoing their imprisonment. Mr Murphy, the Governor, received the visitors very graciously and introduced them to the prisoners. They saw first Mr Dillon, who conversed cheerfully on everyday subjects for fully an hour, and

then to the nature of the wound from which no shot had been extracted owing to the weak state of the sufferer. Yesterday morning gangrene set in, and he died from exhaustion at the hour named.

The jury returned a verdict in accordance with the evidence of Doctor Faris, and the friends of deceased (who was a married man, aged 32 years) had the body removed.

This morning District Inspector Dunning arrested a third man named John Molloy, Kilmorna, on suspicion of being concerned in the outrage, and to-morrow is fixed for a magisterial investigation.

FATAL CAR ACCIDENT IN THE CITY.

This afternoon Mr Coroner Decourey held an inquest at Mr Walsh's establishment, Nelson-st., on the body of Catherine Mary Brummell, aged five years, who came by her death yesterday morning in consequence of a car running over her in that thoroughfare.

Head-constable M'Brinn conducted the proceedings.

Mr Gaffney, solicitor, appeared for the driver of the car; and Mr Doyle, solicitor, for the next of kin of deceased.

James M'Carthy, of Nelson-street, deposed that he was coming down that street at about half-past 11 on the morning of the 3rd inst., when he saw a covered car on the left hand side advancing at a fair trot; at the same instant a child ran across the street, and endeavoured to cross before the car reached her, but, evidently seeing her danger, turned back, and in doing so the wheel of the car struck her across the chest, and passed over her chest and neck; he shouted to the driver before this occurred, but in his opinion the driver could not have stopped in time; the driver pulled up immediately afterwards and rendered all assistance, witness helping to put the child in the car; she was then driven to Barrington's Hospital, where life was found to be extinct.

William Harris, 4 Schoolhouse Lane, agreed in substance with the evidence of the preceding witness, stating that the road was fairly clear at the time.

Dr Jordan, Resident Surgeon at Barrington's Hospital, gave medical testimony as to cause of death. When admitted to the hospital life proved to be extinct; he made an external examination of the body, and found an extensive contusion on the right side of the scalp; the lower jaw was fractured on the left side; the soft parts about the elbow were contused, and there was also a fracture of one of the bones of the forearm; deceased also sustained a fracture of the base of the skull, death resulting from shock.

The Jury returned a verdict of "accidental death," censuring the owner of the conveyance for allowing so juvenile a person to be in charge of a car in the city.

At the City Police Court this morning, before Mr G. W. Bassett, a young lad named Michael O'Brien was brought up in custody charged with having unlawfully, negligently, and carelessly driven his horse and car in the street, whereby Catherine Mary Brummell received such injuries as caused her death.

Some evidence having been given, the accused was admitted to bail to attend when called on.
