GO LONDON IN FIVE DAYS.

Telegram, dated New York, Wednesday's Sun, in its seaboard current week, announces that Mr. [Name] intends to establish a new steamship line between the United States and Europe, with 12,000 ton steel vessels, having a speed of 18 miles an hour. It is estimated that these ships, all of which are to be built in the United States, will shorten the distance between New York and London by 1,000 miles. The first ship is intended to take passengers from New York and convey them to London in the finest vestibule car yet constructed. They would reach London after landing at Milford Haven. In conclusion, nothing has here been said of the realization of this scheme, but the realization of this scheme would be a great boon to the Americans to run as do English companies. The United States Bill, granting four million dollars, removes that obstacle. It is expected that within two years ships will be in commission, and the finest ever built. The total cost of the line is estimated to amount to 12,000,000 dollars. Mr. [Name] questioned yesterday regarding the scheme, would only say that he did not intend to publish it.

ACQUIRED CAREER.

Zaleskeviex, a native of Kostronia, and formerly commander of the Czar Alexander II, died in hospital on Sunday. Zaleskeviex left the Czar owing to a false accusation. He was dismissed from service and immense estates confiscated. His excellent military record saved him from Siberia. After four years of confinement in a fortress, Zaleskeviex escaped to Odessa. From that place he embarked on a sailing vessel for the Mediterranean, and thence he returned to London. Finally he went to New York last December, where he was imprisoned and the hardships of the prison life ruined his health, and when he returned to Philadelphia last month he was suffering, and fortunate in obtaining the hospital where he died.
