DEATH OF A POST OFFICE OFFICIAL.

We much regret to record the death of Mr John Fitzgerald, one of the first-class clerks in the Limerick Post Office, which took place in St. John's Hospital, on Thursday evening last, from rheumatic fever. The sad news was heard with surprise and the deepest sorrow by his numerous friends in this City, who saw him so late as ten days ago in his usual vigorous health. It is said, we don't know on what foundation, that the development of Mr Fitzgerald's illness was due to the defective sanitary arrangements of the Markets Post Office, of which the deceased young gentleman had been in charge for a considerable time past. If such is the case the Post Office should surely lose no time in having an examination made of the office, and remedying the matter without delay. Mr Fitzgerald was a most courteous and obliging official, and one who possessed a thorough knowledge of his business, as evidenced by the fact that though only 24 years of age he had attained an important position in the service. Last evening the remains were removed from St Michael's R.C Church for interment at Mount St. Laurence Cemetery. There were present, a large number of the employees of the Post Office representing every department, and several merchants and other citizens. Wreaths were sent by the deceased's colleagues and other friends.

THE FRENCH GOVERNMENT AND THE LARTIGUE RAILWAY SYSTEM.

A very important commission, sent by the French Government, has just inspected the Listol and Ballybunion Railway, built on the Lartigue system, with the special view of the application of this system of railway to several very extensive lines to be built in the French colonies. The commission consisted of M.M. Fournil, Inspector-General of Bridges and Roads, and President of the Permanent Committee of Public Works for the French Colonies; M. Aubin, Engineer-in-Chief to the Guadeloupe Government and Engineer of the Ponts Chaussees; and M Thomas, engineer to Lail and Co., Paris. The party were accompanied by Mr F. B. Behr, Managing Director of the Latigue Railway Company; Mr Duff Bruce, Chairman of the Delhi, Umballa, Kalka Railway of India, who contemplate applying the Lartigue system in the construction of a very difficult

The Special Commissioner of the man says:

Having been in Limerick on Monday I proceeded to have a look over the market ground where the forthcoming Horse Show will take place on Thursday and Friday, June 25th and 26th and when making my rounds I had as my companions and cicerones the energetic secretary, the show, Mr M. J. Kenny, and a few of the hardest working on the committee, Messrs W Fitt and O. D. Coll, V.S, who, with some of the members of the committee, have been indefatigable in their exertions to secure a success issue for their show, which I think they will attain. To begin with, the entries which have been received up to midday on Monday close on one hundred in excess of last year's total and these will no doubt be considerably augmented when the entries close on Monday as the time for receiving entries on site fees was extended to June 8, and double fees to June 15. No better grounds or place could be selected than market ground on which to hold the show to begin with it is within the city it only a few minutes' drive of the railway station, part of which actually runs into the corn market, but of this more anon. The work concern, which covers several acres in extent in a square, and bounded by a high stone wall with Cathedral-place on one side, William street on another. The gate for pedestrians to pass into the show yard opens off latter, and in the square to which it admits will be the judging rings, two in number; ranged round the wall of this square a many boxes and stalls for the horses are at present in course of erection, but not sufficient for the entries, so that some will have to be put in the adjoining corn market, which will be a sort of annexe. In the spacious butter market which is also within the grounds—will be the butter show, and that will form quite a attraction for many people, as a working dairy will be in full operation there. Within the market is a large open house used by the railway company for loading and unloading corn, this will be partitioned off for exhibits. In the market field a spacious stand is in course of erection and all but completed, while the vaulted jumps to decide the 'lepping' competitions are also in course of erection, the double jumps completed for some time past, so that it will be quite firm. The market field is in a second edition, but on a smaller scale of the jumping at Ball's-bridge; but track at Limerick is a grass one, but the same a capital one, as there it is that all the gatherings have been held for many years, and a meeting of this kind has been held over it during the current week. The same circular track that has been used by the athletes will serve for the purpose as that over which the driving competition and all the harness turn-outs will come off save at Ball's-bridge alone.
